AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS

An amendment to the Vida McKenzie Community Center Bylaws is needed in order to move forward in obtaining a property tax exemption through Lane County. Our Bylaws must have a section that basically says, "The Board of Directors shall distribute the assets of the corporation to charitable organization when the Vida McKenzie Community Center Corporation is dissolved."

Our Bylaws require that we conduct a meeting or conduct a mailing to our membership to vote upon changes to the Bylaws. We have decided that we will use the mail process as the voting method. Attached to this newsletter will be a written summary of the proposed amendment change.

Please vote and mail in the ballot. All ballots must be postmarked by November 1, 2003.

TAI-CHI at the COMMUNITY CENTER

Earlier this year two McKenzie Valley residents took part in an accelerated Tai-Chi course in north Eugene. It was designed to help improve balance, circulation, muscle toning, joint flexibility and coordination for seniors. The positive results from the daily sessions caused the women to tell other people about the experience.

Now Tai-Chi classes for women and men are being offered at the Community Center. Happily, with its new IRS 501(c)3 classification, the Vida McKenzie Community Center is in a position to offer the Center for classes as a community service.

In early September, an instructor, Paige Semich agreed to provide the instructional portion if there was interest in the Vida area. The interest was there and classes are being held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 to 11 am. Paige says all ages and abilities are welcome. There is a modest fee of \$5.00 for drop-ins and for those who register for the month in advance pay \$3 a class.

Instructor Semich points out that Tai-Chi is known as a walking meditation. She says it improves memory and breathing, lowers blood-pressure as well as heightening internal awareness. Because Tai-Chi is a highly individualized practice, she said "it allows students to progress through the forms at their own pace to match their own abilities." Among the many values of Tai-Chi, she noted, is that it helps relax the mind, gently stimulates the body and give individuals power to maintain and improve personal health.

UPGRADE TO CENTER

ELECTRICAL: We have been working this summer on obtaining donations for the badly needed electrical upgrade. A generous donation from EWEB has provided some funding for the electrical upgrade in the building. We have requested bids from several local contractors and the bids will determine how much work the center can currently afford. Funding to completely rewire the building may have to be done in phases over a few years as funds become available. Estimates on work 5 to \$6000.00.

Our goal is to relocate the meter and add a new main circuit box with increased capacity. New wires, switches and plugs would improve the (Cont. on page 3)

In August we began an adventure with a new fund-raiser. It has been successful so far due to the response of our membership and those in the McKenzie Valley that





WINDOWS: We have six large windows in the main room that provide a different view from each window of the outside world. But these windows do not provide much in heat retention during the winter months or ventilation during the summer. We also have seven smaller windows that need to be replaced for the same reason.

We have several members that have come forward with an offer to donated the cost of a window: Todd and April Olson, Bob and Dawn Neilsen, Robert and Rita Gibbs and the Vida-McKenzie Neighborhood Watch.
