Another year has come and gone. Each year since we as a community have taken over the center we have continued to move forward with upgrade projects. Some include: a new roof, replacement of the stove and refrigerator, forced air heater, painting of the inside of the center, remodel of bathrooms, IRS 501c(3) certification, highway signs, monthly bingo games, successful Civil War game ticket raffle which brought in over \$700 thanks to a donation of 2 tickets by Mille Hass, Leaburg Christmas Bazaar (16 members worked to make this a success) operation that netted our Center over \$650. We have also been fortunate to have several local organizations (McKenzie River Lions, Late Bloomers Garden Club, EWEB to name a few) donate funds to the Center. Some of us can do the work sometimes, but not all of us can do it all the time. The monthly Bingo operation has been a success. It is a renewable monthly source of income for the Center. Someone beside Joyce and I must learn this operation. After this February game Joyce and I may be unavailable for several months. If this source of income for the Center is to continue then someone needs to come forward to learn the process between now and February.

After the first of the year we will begin our membership drive and hold our annual member meeting on May 1st., but for now as we end the year during this holiday season, we wish one and all a very *Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.*




