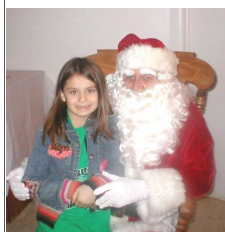
## CHRISTMAS BAZAAR

WOW. Unbelievable year so far. Many things have been accomplished. But many things still need to be done.

Todd and April Olson with their painting service are very good friends to the Center.

We thank the members who came forward and donated extra money to complete the window upgrade. And all of you that have and continue to support the Bingo games. The donations of food items for the snack bar. Those that have helped with the bingo games, helped with the annual cleanup around the Center or worked at the varies events, including the Christmas Bazaar, thank you.

Walter Reim, Vern Blumhagen and Bernadette St.Onge-Barnes are still working on our tax exemption.

Our next major upgrade will be the replacement of the flooring in the Center. Estimates to replace the wood floor in the main room have come in at \$12,000. Repair and refinishing estimates come in around \$4,000. Vern has taken the flooring project on himself. He has contacted contractors for estimates and he has completed three grant applications for flooring. One to Weyerhaeuser, one to the Stewart Foundation and one to Jerry's Home Improvement Center. When the wood flooring is completed we will move toward replacement of the tiled floor covering.

Millie, Bernadette and Joyce have taken on the fund raising. The raffle baskets continue to be a big hit as fundraisers at our events. Probably our next major fund (Cont. p4)
