He must have thought it fun as he was hopping across the county leaving his signature barefoot drawing that lead the law enforcement community to tag him the barefoot bandit.

This kid was smart in some ways in which he alluded capture for over two years. But just plain stupid in thinking he could keep the escapade he was living going on forever. If he would have stopped his crime wave after one or maybe two events, he may have gotten away with. It appears the thrilling life he was living, the fun of creating crimes and leaving a calling card for the police to find was just too much for him to pass up. But the longer he continued his fun, the more people become involved, the greater chance he will end up as in the picture. It does not look like the good times are rolling for him right now. I made a few phone calls to the local police in Sandy Point to learn that the "Barefoot Bandit" had stolen a plane in Indiana, somehow flown it to the Bahamas, ran out of fuel about 5 miles from the small village of Sandy Point where he crashed the plane in the mangroves, found one road that leads to Sandy Point, came across our house, broke in and stole the car.

My first reactions were anger, dismay, frustration and a sense of helplessness. As the day wore on, and some perspective was gained, I calmed down and realized the man was on an Island of 9,000 people, one traffic light, and many alert citizens who just don't miss much if there is something, or someone, new to the community.

Two days later I got a call back from Anthony. The police had located the car, parked near the stoplight (fifty miles away), nicely parked, undamaged and ready to be returned. I guess all's well that ends well, but it still rankles me to think that I had a very small part in this jerk's escapades! The other happy ending is that a few days, (and a few stolen boats) later, the Bahamian police actually caught the guy. In the Bahamas, this would amount to the kind of stuff that legends are made of.



Meeting: Lane County Deputy Sheriff David Silano. It was a very interesting first half of the meeting hearing from the guest speakers. Commissioner Stewart talked about the replacement of the Goodpasture Bridge and showed some new roofing material that might replace the current roof of the bridge and several other County topics. Chief Ledyard touched base on what was new at the Fire Department, and the new Fire Chief. Marge Estenson, talked about the history of the McKenzie River Club and leading into the formation of the Vida McKenzie Community Center. Deputy Silano fielded many questions regarding some of the criminal activity around the Vida area in the past few months. Jim Goodpasture presented the group with some interesting topics regarding the current fishing regulations.

And then it was the president of the organizations, Walter Wilson's time to talk. He spoke of the accomplishments the Center had achieved over the past year: Rebuilding of the storage shed, replacing the damaged overhead door,



adding ADA chair height toilets and adding metal bars in the toilets stalls. After many years of looking at the blue cover over the bingo board, it finally got a new face, thanks to Hal Stein. The Center is still working on completing the outside lighting, reworking some of the kitchen cabinets for ease of use and replacing the sound speaker system.

Walt emphasized the great support the Center enjoys from the community as it has allowed the Center to increase the funding for the McKenzie High School scholarship's, the McKenzie Mobile Meals in Leaburg, the McKenzie River Lions and East Lane Veterinary Angel Animal Fund. The Christmas Bazaar and monthly family fun bingo night continues to be the major fundraisers. Several groups continue to use the Center on a regular basis. Over the past year the Center was rented 126 times. Walt said that the membership was currently at 147 and the dues are still only \$10.00 per family.

Walt opened up the elections for officers and board members. The membership was pleased with the current officers and re-elected them.

Somewhere during the meeting a break was taken and everyone enjoyed a piece of the “10th Year Anniversary” cake and some punch and coffee.

Before closing Walt encouraged everyone to become involved with the Center's activities in order to not burn out the many that have been helping out for a long time. The monthly bingo games always needs help to keep them running and the Christmas Bazaar has many tasks that need to be done. In closing Walt thanked those in attendance and the McKenzie Valley community for the great support they have given the Center over the years.

THE RIVER GIVETH AND THE RIVER TAKETH

The McKenzie River flows from one end of the McKenzie Valley to the other as it continues on its journey to the sea. It was just a few weeks ago when the Sheriff's Office and Fire Department's were warning the public of the dangers of the river. As this is being written the high murky swift current has passed and the crystal clean cold water that we know as the McKenzie has returned.

On June 18th, Lon and Myrna Mills and a group of friends gather each month for a little social time and dinner as we have done for many years. Lon and Myrna were leaving the following day on their vacation. Each month birthdays are celebrated for any member of our group having a birthday. We offer birthday cards, birthday wishes and sometimes sing the "Happy Birthday" song. Lon was the birthday boy being celebrated for June. He did not live to see his birthday. The warnings about river danger really hit home on June 23rd.

Lon and Myrna, his sister, Wanda, and Wanda's husband, Milton, met in Colorado for a family get together. This vacation time was to include a raft trip down the Arkansas River in the area of Salida, Colorado. The river was running at 1980 cubic feet per second through Salida on Wednesday June 23rd when they put their raft in the water in the vicinity of the Big Bend Recreation Area.

This started a fun leisurely trip down the Arkansas River. About 2 miles northwest of Salida, the raft containing the 2 couples went over a diversion dam in the river throwing all four into the water. Myrna and Wanda were wearing life preservers but Lon and Milton were not. Myrna and Wanda were able to make it to the bank and out of the river on their own.

Their screams for help caught the attention of many along the bank of the river. Calls to 911 brought the local rescue service. The boating accident turned rapidly into a tragedy when Lon and Milton did not surface after going over the diversion dam. A couple miles downriver one of the men was pulled from the river near Riverside Park and the other close by as the river flowed through downtown Salida. Both were given CPR and transported to the local hospital. Lon was airlifted by Flight for Life to St. Anthony Hospital in Denver. Unfortunately, even with heroic efforts by the emergency responders and hospital personnel, Lon did not recover. He passed away early Thursday morning.

My friend Lon was no stranger to a river. He probably had his drift boat or raft on most all of the rivers in Oregon and many other places. He loved getting his boat out on the river working the swirling water as he drifted through the rapids and enjoying a day of fishing. Lon was a man of short stature and was the brunt of many "short" jokes, but he stood tall, like a mighty oak tree. If you hit him with a joke he hit back with two. Lon was my friend and a friend to many in the McKenzie Valley and around the state of Oregon. He may be gone but he will never be forgotten. And now, the tragedy continues as two families try and put their lives back together. I have not met Lon's sister Wanda, but he had spoken of her many times in our social gatherings. I am truly thankful that Myrna and Wanda survived this tragic event.

The rivers continue to flow about their merry way. The water in some places like the McKenzie River and the Arkansas River runs swift, clear and cold. Others look like chocolate pudding as they continue their flow. They roar as the water breaks through the rapids, splash about and sparkle like diamonds in the sunlight. But despite all this beauty, they all have the same silent danger laying just below the surface. They play no favorites. One miscue, a slight error in reading the water and tragedy is upon us who love the excitement of the rivers. Many riding the rapids have been thrown in the water, many have been lucky to survive such an experience and many have not. My friend Lonnie did not survive.




